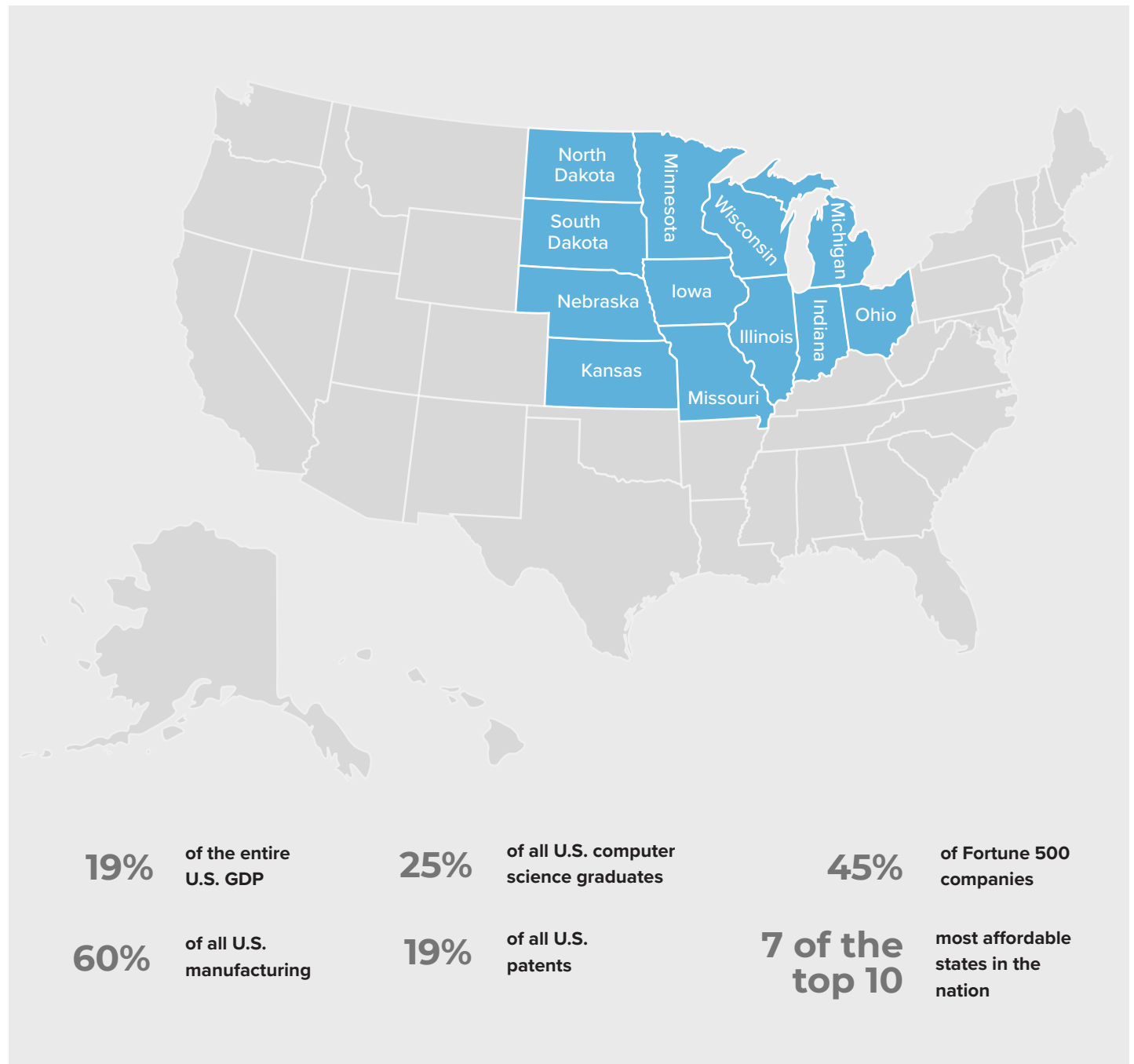

Why We Call It the Heartland

Those who call the Midwest home already know there's more to living here than any statistics can capture. Here are some of the things people love about living in the Midwest.



Some stereotypes are just true. People in the Midwest are really, really nice. In fact, a 2013 study by the University of Cambridge assessed the personality traits of more than 1.5 million people and found that those who were from Midwestern states had “moderately high levels of extraversion, agreeableness, and conscientiousness.” Don't be surprised when your Midwestern neighbor shows up with a casserole to share, that's all we're saying.



The Midwest truly gets the best of all four seasons. Sure, that means surviving sweltering summers and frigid winters. But it also means breaking the winter cold with a mild spring filled with blooming wildflowers, and saying goodbye to summer with a fall season filled with colored foliage that will take your breath away.



That reputation the Midwest has for having nothing but cornfields? It couldn't be further from the truth. **Entertainment is varied and high quality.** For example, Detroit's theater district is the second largest in the world, second only to New York. And before a lot of hit plays have their Broadway premieres, they might have a first run at Chicago's Palace Theater.



As Crowd Companies founder Jeremiah Owyang wrote, **“Both Silicon Valley and the Midwest share the same ethic of hard work.”** What Midwesterners do have less of, however, is stress. A WalletHub study ranked states by their stress levels, and four of the bottom five (North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, and Minnesota) were in the Midwest. Work-life balance? People in the Heartland clearly have that down.



Looking for a little more breathing room? You'll find it in the Midwest, which is home to four of the least densely populated states in the nation (North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, and Kansas). While an acre of land in San Francisco comes with a staggering average value of \$3.2 million, in Midwestern metropolises, an acre can be had for just tens of thousands.



When it comes to affordability, the East and West Coasts have nothing on the Midwest. **According to the US News, seven of the nation's top 10 most affordable states — Ohio, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Nebraska, Kansas, and Missouri — are in the Midwest.** As millennials and Gen Z are entering the housing market in greater and greater numbers, they're drawn to cities and states where their dollars go further, and the Midwest provides (but more on that later).

Balodana Founder **Dana Todd** on Why She Made the Midwest Her Home

Dana Todd has been an entrepreneur most of her professional life. But when the Great Recession caused her San Diego startup to fail in 2010, she took a job in Chicago. Little did she know how much she would come to love the Midwest—or that she'd find the Heartland to be the perfect place to build her next business venture.

Why did you start your business in the Midwest?

When I decided to go back into entrepreneurship, it just made sense for me to grow Balodana here. We're building a slow fashion supply chain of international providers of custom made clothing, and it feels right to be in a city with major manufacturing history. I really like the way people do business in Chicago and the greater Midwest. It's friendly and supportive and "real", and there are so many entrepreneurial spirits like myself. This is striver country. Chicago itself has much to offer; it's a major city, but it seems like a small town once you've lived here a while. My experiences in the Bay Area have felt very different, very cutthroat and disingenuous. My second choice would be NYC because of the business connections for funding and access to the fashion industry, but the cost of living and working there is prohibitive.

What do you love about the Midwest?

The cost of living here is very attractive, and the people are salt of the earth. Sports is a unifying religion in any town here, and in Chicago there are so many wonderful places to eat as an amateur foodie. I have become a big fan of cheese curds, something I never thought I'd say.

The people are diverse—Chicago has a wealth of ethnic and LGBTQ+ representation from around the world, and while it's not perfect in terms of equality for people of color, it's at least on its way to improved opportunity for all.

The startup scene here is not as overcrowded and competitive as the Bay Area and New York, so you can more easily find your place in the community, and it feels like you have so many people who want you to succeed. It's also got fantastic support for women—we have organizations like the Women's Business Development Center that provide free and sliding scale resources to help women founders and business owners. We were selected for the 1871 WiSTEM program last year, and the lessons learned there will forever impact me.

Why should tech workers consider job searching in the Midwest?

I think a lot of younger people are looking for affordable housing, for one thing, particularly as they create families. There's also a rich lifestyle to be gained here, without sacrificing all the things a big city has to offer. People are very family oriented here, they create tribes that last

generations. It feels humanistic. Even in the smaller cities and university towns, it's really a refreshing change of pace. There are also plenty of jobs in tech, and many of them are entry level and mid-level, so it's great for people who are feeling trapped in companies with little advancement opportunity.

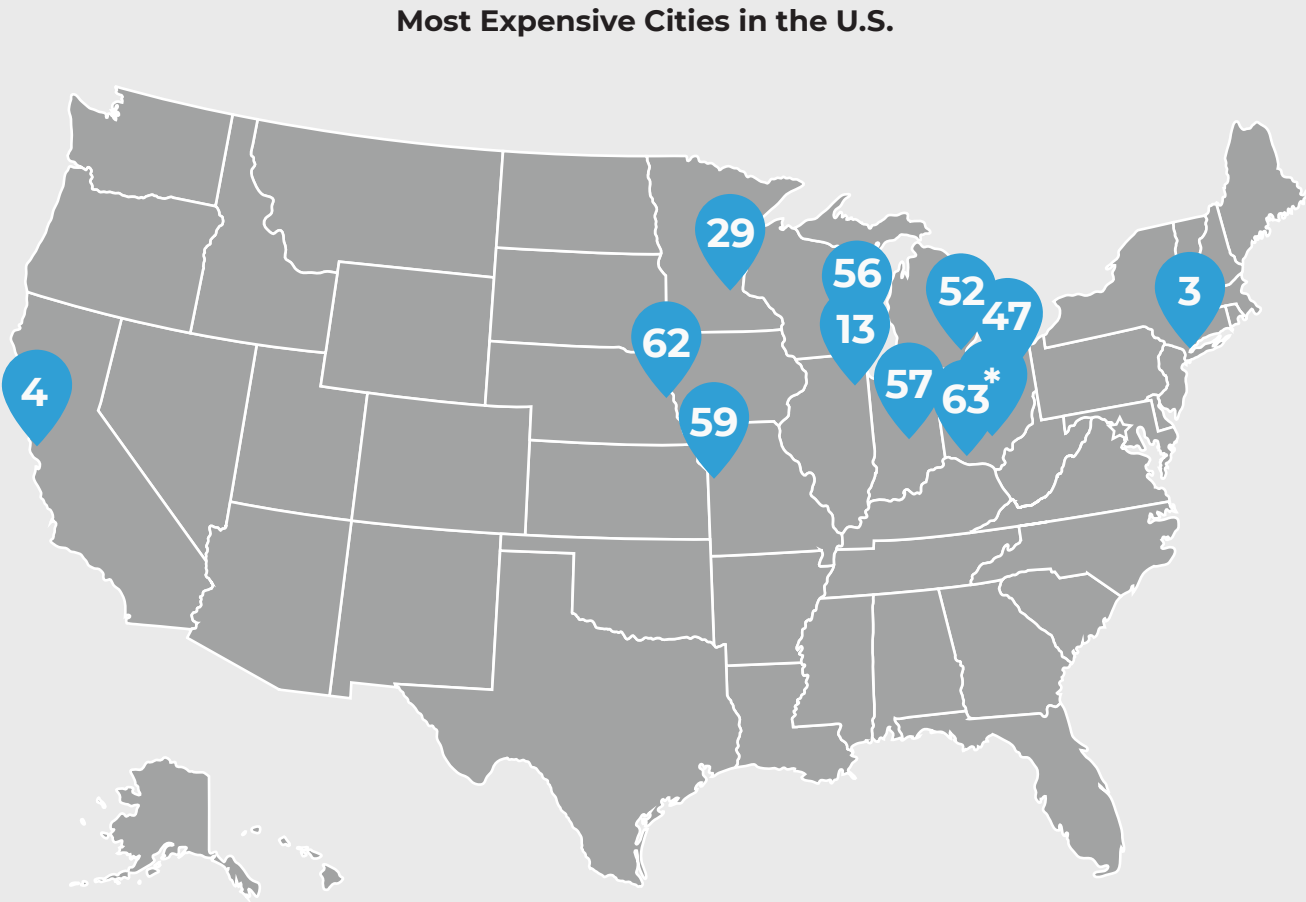
Is the Midwest the next big wave in tech and startups?

Being a Midwesterner in part means you're not prone to hype or self-aggrandizing behavior, and that's led us to be overlooked for a very long time. We've got so many universities here and so many major industries represented, it's not surprising that we have a lot to offer in tech and innovation. Recently, a few big names in tech are pointing out our value, and it's naturally leading to an influx of attention. We can sustain a lot of growth here in Chicago, we've got physical room and plenty of capital for the right investments (albeit mostly later stage companies). I do hope that we're not a "wave" though, because that implies it'll ebb and flow. I would hate to see the core personality of the Midwest change drastically, and I'd like to see the growth be strategic and long lasting. One thing I do hope will change, is that we get enough early stage capital for seed stages. The bulk of the investments here are lower risk, B and C rounds plus private equity. It's hard to raise unicorns without a healthy supply of unicorn food.

From software and network engineers to HR specialists and account executives, Midwest startups are recruiting plenty of new talent.

We looked at three of the largest, fastest-growing, and most popular Midwest cities to see which jobs were in high demand. According to Glassdoor, these are the tech jobs that had the highest number of new, active job postings per month in Chicago, Detroit, and Columbus.

Founder of Fiveable, an education startup based in Milwaukee, Wisconsin

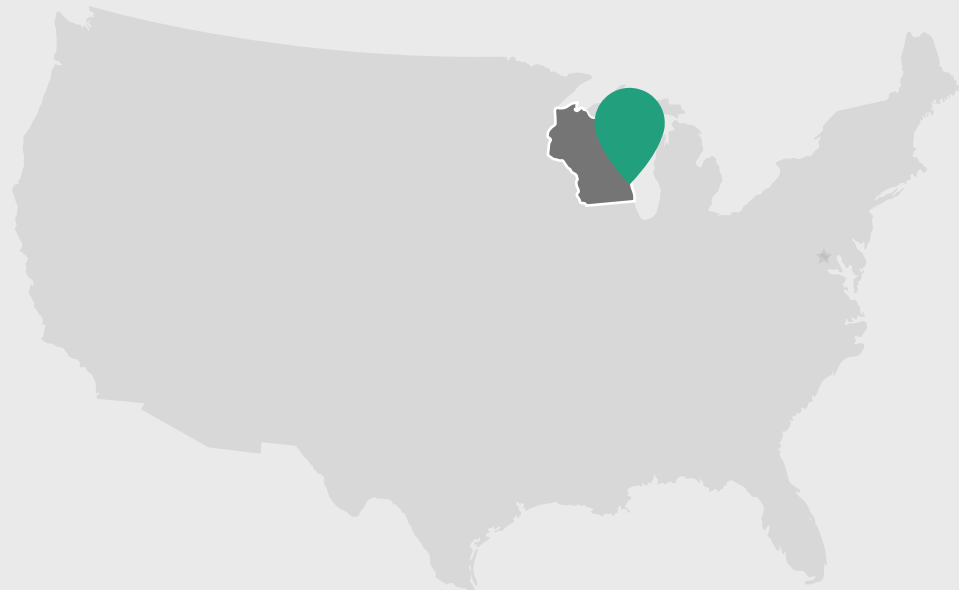
When she was just starting her education startup Fiveable, Founder Amanda DoAmaral was accepted into gener8tor, an accelerator in Milwaukee. But after experiencing a taste of growing a startup in the Midwest, Amanda knew it was where she wanted to stay.

“We decided to relocate our HQ to Milwaukee because it's such a supportive community,” she said. “It's just easier to build relationships in a small city rather than a big one. Everyone knows each other and there's this underdog feeling that I definitely relate to. If we had HQ in a big coastal city, we would be overlooked because of competition for attention. Here, we have a close support group and more access to resources like investors, mentors, and press. The coasts are saturated with investors, startups, and talent. That creates opportunity for the Midwest to grow successful companies and attract talent. The underdog feeling is motivating. I'm excited to be part of this wave.”

And when it comes to attracting top talent to help her company grow? DoAmaral says that's easy, because the affordable cost of living, yet comparable lifestyle makes tech workers—particularly young ones—want to check out Milwaukee.

“Rent and living costs are insane in SF and NYC, but in Milwaukee it's affordable. That allows us to invest our resources differently and alleviates some of the personal stress we feel,” she explained. “You decrease rent and living costs by 50-100%. That lets you spend more on things you want rather than living costs. You can save more, pay off debts faster, and generally be happier because of it. I think a lot of people from the coasts look at

the Midwest as flat farmlands with nothing here. It's flyover country. I get it. I lived in Boston and Oakland my whole life and definitely did not see the Midwest as comparable. But the cities here are really no different. Milwaukee is about the size of Boston. There's everything you could ever want in a city.”





Matt Vollmer

President of Arbre Technologies, Inc.,
an inventory management startup
based in Wisconsin.

Matt Vollmer is a Wisconsin native, so starting a company in his home state was a no-brainer.

"I grew up here, I went to school here, I worked here, am raising a family here, and built a network here," he said.

"There is lots of opportunity here. We have a solid education system and a healthy startup culture. More than anything, we have great people with great values which means solid family life, and awesome coworkers that align with our company's core values."

When it comes to recruiting the most talented tech workers from the coasts, Vollmer said his strategy is to not even try.

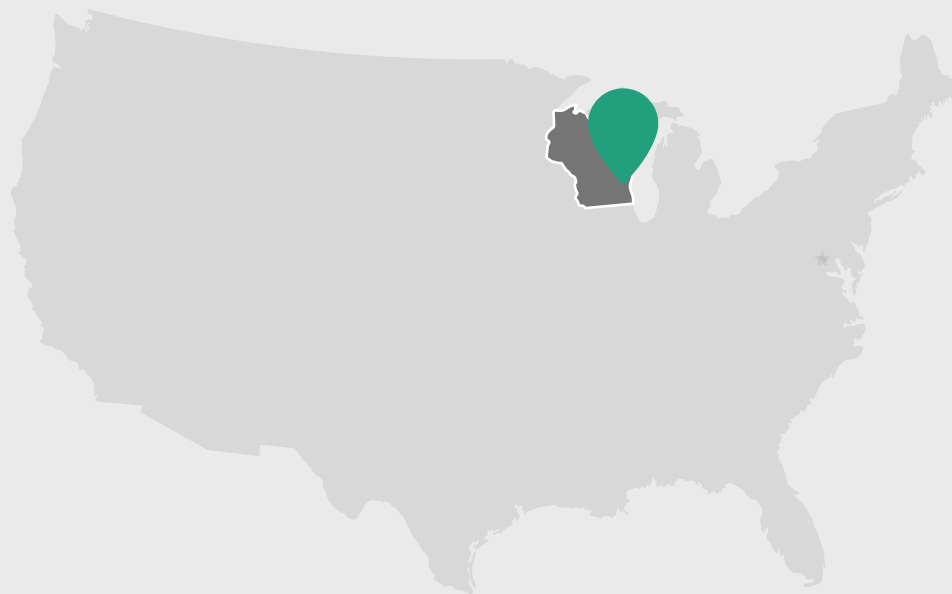
"There are very talented people right here in the Midwest that grew up here, went to school here, and worked here most of their lives," he explained. "There may be a need to recruit talent out of state at some point in the future, but there is solid talent right here where we live. You can teach someone skills, but you can't teach them new core values."

For the foreseeable future, Vollmer said he's just looking forward to watching the tech scene in the Midwest continue to flourish due to the values that naturally occur here.

"There is certainly an upward trend," he said.

"There is capital here, and startups here are focused on

profitability. I think the investment community will continue to prioritize profitability over inflated valuations of companies that never run in the black and never leave 'startup mode.' the Midwest is certainly the right place to find startups that fit that mold."

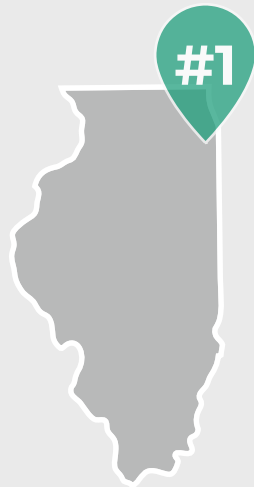


The Midwest's Top 10 Cities

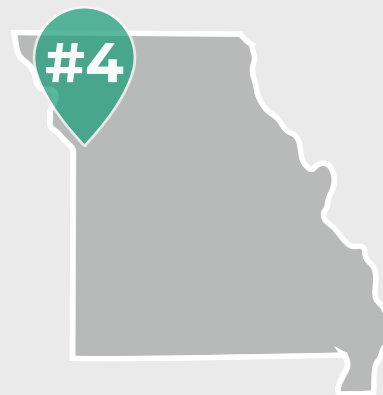

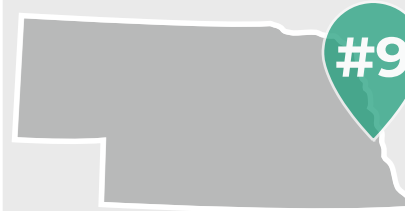

How Do Salaries In the Midwest Compare?

Sure, the cost of living is more affordable in the Midwest than on the coasts. But doesn't that mean salaries are lower, too?

Not necessarily!

For a number of the most common jobs at tech startups, Midwest company salaries are pretty comparable to what similar positions pay in the Golden State and the Big Apple. But when you factor in the Midwest's more affordable costs for housing, dining, entertainment, and more—that's when you see that even a slightly lower salary in the Midwest can actually translate to more money in your pocket.

The numbers tell the whole story. Read on to see how salaries compare across the Midwest for some of the most in-demand tech jobs. Plus, we'll see how much you'd have to make in San Francisco and New York City to maintain the same standard of living you can have in the Midwest.
